- Act 3 Redemption Initiated: The King Chooses Israel
- Act 4 Redemption Accomplished: The Coming of the King
- Act 5 The Mission of the Church: Spreading the News of the King
- Act 6 Redemption Completed: The Return of the King

WHY DOES THE STORYLINE OF THE BIBLE MATTER?

For Interpreting the Bible

- Provides the broader context for understanding any given passage in the Bible
 - Ask yourself: Where am I in the storyline of Scripture?
- Demonstrates the progressive nature of God's revelation in the Bible
 - Ask yourself: Where else do I see this in Scripture? Is this a pattern/theme that is repeated?
- Reveals the central figure and climactic center of the Bible—Jesus Christ and his redemptive work (i.e. life, death, and resurrection)
 - Ask yourself: How does this point to or stand in relation to the person and/or work of Jesus Christ?
- Helps identify both the unity of the Bible and its rich diversity
 - Ask yourself: How does this contribute to the overall storyline of Scripture? What
 is unique about this passage in comparison to others throughout the storyline of
 Scripture?

For Christian Living and Our Place in the World

- Romans 12:1-2 We are to live lives of sacrificial worship to God. We will either be shaped by...
 - The World "Do not be conformed to this world..."
 - The Word "Be transformed by the renewing of your mind..."
- Our whole lives are shaped by some story
 - The way we understand human life depends on what conception we have of the human story. What is the real story of which my life story is a part?" - Leslie Newbigin



CHRISTIAN STORY: UNDERSTANDING THE STORYLINE OF THE BIBLE

CREATION: GOD ESTABLISHES HIS KINGDOM

1. God brings all things into being by his sovereign word.

Key text: Gen. 1:1 (cf. Rev. 4:11)

God is the supreme ruler over all creation, he created all things and all things exist for him.

2. God's creation is very good.

Key text: Gen. 1:10, 12, 18, 21, 25, 31

In Genesis 1-2 we see that God's character is reflected in his creation and it reveals his design and purpose for it. The Garden of Eden and Adam and Eve's role in it is a glimpse of what God desires for the whole of creation as history unfolds.

3. God creates humanity in his own image—the image of God

Key text: Gen. 1:26-28; 2:15

God's creation of humanity is the high point of the creation account and reveals humanity's special relationship to their Creator and unique role in creation.

CREATION: GOD ESTABLISHES HIS KINGDOM

1) WHO IS THE "LORD GOD"

• Elohim (Gen. 1); YHWH Elohim (Gen. 2:3); YHWH (Ex. 3; 6:1-12)

2) A FAITH FOR ISRAEL

- Polemical/Argumentative Purposeful words to contradict false truth
- The attention is not on the creation, but on the One who created. Israel begins to see that this God is different

3) WHAT KIND OF LITERATURE IS GENESIS?

- Not just polemic, but carefully put together in order to show that God is the divine source of all things
- He stands apart from all other things and he has a special relationship with his creation

4) THE GOD WHO BRINGS ALL THINGS INTO BEING

- God is the Artist of ALL things (1) In the beginning, (2) created, (3) God [acting subject]
- Creation is a product of his personal will and the work of his hand
- He creates all things, names all things, he is Lord over all creation, and his creation is good
- · God does not withhold himself from his creation

5) HUMANKIND AS GOD'S IMAGE

- Man and Woman are created. We are not merely random products of time and chance
- Humankind is unique among God's creatures
- We are made in His image with a unique vocation; We were made male and female. Made to be in relationships; We have a responsibility.

6) THE WORLD AS GOD'S KINGDOM

- Adam and Eve's royal stewardship is to be a small version of what God intends to happen to the whole of creation as history unfolds.
- This same God will ultimately redeem and return for his own as humanity begins to do what's right in his own eyes.
